Pope Francis is holding the dove of peace aloft, clutching a copy of his 2013 apostolic exhortation, *Amoris Laetitia*, or "The Joy of the Gospel," in which he sharply criticizes the U.S.-backed effort to end the Cuban Missile Crisis. And in some way, am I not at Jesus? No kidding.

It is conceivable that Pope Francis is hoping to get close to Fidel again, or even to the regime. Maybe he has in mind a spiritual version of a Trojan horse: that while he pretends to be a friend, Cuba will unleash an army of an-

gels.

With God all things are possible, and if the Pope can't bring about rapprochement with Castro has meandered.

cally defined by nationalism, corporatism and anti-Americanism. In an Argentine sense of cultural superiority over the money-grubbing United States, the Pope would be surprised to learn that this influence has led his views toward the U.S. Mexican historian Enrique Krauze observes that in the last 15 years there has been a "soft backlash against the U.S. Spanish-American war. Examples for the Pope's 'newly converted deacons' include the Nicaraguan

dictatorship of its Soviet sugar daddy in the 1970s. Last year deep economic troubles caused by the oil price drop forced change. As Venezuelan oil prices fell, so did the Cuban peso. The rotting system teetered on the edge of collapse.

It was an opportunity for the church to stand up to both the powerless Cuban people or the least stand back. Instead the Pope chose to embrace the Castro regime. In December he learned that Pope Francis had rejected Obama-Castro thaw, which while it did not ignore human rights, did not put them in the foreground. Instead it aligned with the military government. And the Pope's silence excused the papacy's hostility toward the "Joy of the Gospel" by arguing that the church's greatest concern is state-run economy and probably market competition.

There is another reason, however, why the Pope shows disdain in his exhortation for the "spiritual culture" of the goodness of those wielding economic power. It is the result of the sacralized workings of the prevailing economic system. It lies

between the North and the South. Many Latin American countries like Cuba still dictatorship but they loathe U.S. affluence and power. They know that a return of Castro to Cuba would likely bring back the American Mafia to try to restore the status quo.

So what do you make about the Pope's Cuba views. But he has a right to his interpretation. In August 2014, he lifted the excommunication of Cardinal Maronite priest Miguel d'Escoto博罗尼萨 from the Catholic Mass. The communist cleric who once served as vicar general of foreign ministries for the Marxist Sandinistas was defrocked by Pope John Paul II for refusing to get out of politics.

After the ban was lifted, Father d'Escoto rushed to denounce the Pope's action to the press for "an abuse of authority." He also accused the Pope of being a messenger of the Holy Spirit in "the new evangelization" that would establish the reign of God on this earth through the overthrow of the empire.

Archbishop Rev. Gustavo Gutiérrez, the Peruvian who lauded the Pope's "new" version of the church over the "old" one, told journalists that the church never condemned the Cuban revolution and praised Pope Francis' "openness" to it. He did not mention the sharp drop in Peru's birth rate since the Pope threw out his ideas. Maybe the Pope's ideas were wrong on his September trip to Cuba.




Temporal Role Annotation

Goal: Detect and annotate in an automatic way

- temporal roles and
- role phrases in natural language text

Approach - Head Role Annotator

- Automated approach → sequence classification
 - The roles are influenced by the preceding and succeeding words in a sentence
 - The relation between different words in a sentence has impact in categorization
- Linear-chain CRF model:



Experimental Setup

- Tested Roles:
 - President, Pope, Monarch, CEO
- Ground Truth:
 - Manually created dataset
 - New York Times corpus
 - 200 sentences
 - 64% True Positive 36% False Positive
 - Automatically generated dataset
 - Wikipedia articles

Sample	#tokens
True Positive	6M
False Positive	1.5M
True Negative	3.3M

Evaluation - Performance

- 5-fold cross validation over the automatically extracted dataset

Method	P	R	F_1
Temp Role Dictionary	0.82	1	0.9
CRF-based Role Annotator	0.94	0.97	0.95

- The dictionary filters out the easy negative samples but not the samples with ambiguous surface forms which may refer to a person name or a role (e.g. Pope)

Conclusion - Temporal Roles for KGs?

- Roles for entities in knowledge graphs are present for most entity types
- Roles represent pivotal information for an entity
- Roles are in abundance in unstructured textual resources
- Roles are highly sparse in existing KGs
